



“X” A New Season of Anointing: Find Your Voice

Scripture: Jeremiah 1, Isaiah 55:11, Psalm 139

Sermon Overview: God anointed Jeremiah to prophesy to Judah and to warn them of the consequences of their idolatry. Jeremiah didn't think he was qualified, but God anoints improbable people to do impossible things with Him.

Sermon Series Question:

1. How big is your God in comparison to your trials?

Sermon-Specific Questions:

1. Pay attention to your weaknesses. God's power is made perfect in our weaknesses. What do you perceive to be your weaknesses? Using your Holy Imagination, how could God use those weaknesses for His Glory?
2. Read Jeremiah 16:2 and 1 Samuel 16-17. Everything that happens now may not make sense to us now, but if we trust God with it, God will use it for His bigger and better purposes. What things did Jeremiah have to trust God with? What about David? Do you have any unanswered questions? How have you been able to trust God through these uncertainties? If you haven't trusted Him yet, how can you now?

Digging Deeper:

1. Read Jeremiah 1:5 and Psalm 139:15-17. God has a plan and purpose for your life. What dreams are in your heart for your life? Take these dreams to the Lord and ask Him about them. If you believe that dream is from the Lord, then find a promise from God's Word and prophesy that promise over your life.
2. Read Jeremiah 1:12 and Isaiah 55:11. Take an inventory of the words you are speaking this week. Are your words a regurgitation of culture or a revelation of God's Word? Make a note of the words that do not match God's words. Find a scripture to counter those words and speak those on purpose instead.
